Language in the 2010 Healthcare Reform Act is very similar to the language in these two current funding opportunities. There are appropriations for \$75,000,000 for years 2010 through 2014.</p>

<p>Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Programs</p>	<p>Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administrations (SAMHSA)Project LAUNCH, the Administration for Children and Families Home Visiting program (ACF), the State Early Learning Councils mandated by the Head Start reauthorization legislation, and other federal agencies</p> <p>SAMHSA currently leads a workgroup collaborating on home visitation programs; the workgroup also includes The Administration for Children and Families, the State Early Learning Councils, and other federal agencies.</p> <p>Early Childhood Visitation is addressed through the two (2)primary federal agency partners:</p> <p>The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act provided funds for ACF to establish an evidence based Home Visitation Program;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>The FY 2010 budget proposes establishment of a Home Visitation program as a capped entitlement designed to support the establishment and expansion of evidence-based home visitation programs for low income families and pregnant women in states and territories. The initiative will primarily fund models that have been rigorously evaluated and shown to have positive effects on critical outcomes for children and families. At the same time, a portion of the funds will be used to support promising models requiring additional evaluation. Research including several randomized control trial studies showed one particular model of home visitation resulted in Medicaid savings from reductions in preterm births, emergency room use, and subsequent births. Expanding proven effective home visitation programs is estimated to save Medicaid \$664 million over ten years, including \$189 million in 2019.</i> <p>SAMHSA's LAUNCH (Linking Actions for Unmet Needs in Children's Health) also places an emphasis on home visitations, early interventions, and evidence based initiatives:</p> <p>http://samhsa.gov/Grants/2010/SM-10-012.aspx The deadline is May 17, 2010 (Awards: up to \$650,000 / year for up to 5 years)</p> <p>Finally, the President's budget for FY2011 has \$8.5 B over 5 years for a variety of Early Childhood Initiatives, including Health Start.</p> <p>It is our opinion that given the SAMHSA led multi-agency workgroup on home visitation programs, is a good indicator of which agencies will be administering and managing these grant funds.</p>	<p>\$1.5 Billion over the next 5 years</p> <p>Authorized – No</p> <p>Appropriated - Yes</p>	<p>Grants to deliver services under early childhood home visitation programs.</p>

<p>School Based Health Centers</p>	<p><u>HRSA – Health Resources and Services Administration</u> - is the primary Federal agency for improving access to health care services for people who are uninsured, isolated or medically vulnerable.</p> <p>HRSA has oversight, including multiple funding opportunities, for the nation's Health Centers. It recently released the following Cooperative Agreement for the establishment of a National Center on School-Based Healthcare to provide support and technical assistance to the 1700 current School-Based Health Centers and for those to be established. <u>National Center on School-Based Health Care Cooperative Agreement Program</u></p> <p>Therefore, we believe that HRSA will be the Federal Agency responsible for the administration and management of the funds set aside for grants in the 2010 Healthcare Reform Act.</p>	<p>\$ 50,000,000 over 3 years</p> <p>Authorized – No</p> <p>Appropriated - Yes</p>	<p>Grants for the establishment and to support the operation of School-Based Health Centers.</p>

Nurse Managed Health Clinics (NMHCs)	<p>HRSA - Health Resources and Services Administration HRSA's Director, Mary Wakefield, is the driving force behind legislation being put forth by the National Advisory Council on Nurse Education and Practice – S. 1104 and H.R. 2754: The Nurse-Managed Health Clinic Reinvestment Act. There is \$60,000,000 appropriated for 2010 and such sums as may be necessary for 2011 through 2015.</p> <p>Sec. 5301 Training in Family Medicine, General Internal Medicine, General Pediatrics, and Physician Assistantship – Sec. 747 Primary Care Training and Enhancement - Grants to an accredited public or nonprofit private hospital, school of medicine or osteopathic medicine, academically affiliated physician assistant training program, or a public or private nonprofit entity for training in Family Medicine, General Internal Medicine, General Pediatrics, and Physician Assistant training programs. There is \$125,000,000 for 2010 and sums as may be necessary for 2011 through 2014.</p> <p>Sec. 5302 – Sec. 747A Training Opportunities for Direct Care Workers – Grants to provide new training opportunities for direct care workers who are employed in long-term care settings for individuals with mental retardation. There are appropriations of \$10,000,000 for 2011 through 2013.</p> <p>Sec. 5303 – Sec. 748 – Training in General, Pediatric, and Public Health Dentistry - Grants to a school of dentistry, public or nonprofit private hospital, or a public or private nonprofit entity to plan, develop, and operate, or participate in, an approved professional training program in the field of general dentistry, pediatric dentistry, or public health dentistry. There are appropriations of \$30,000,000 for 2010 and sums as may be necessary for 2011 through 2015.</p> <p>Sec. 5303 - Sec. 752 Continuing Educational Support for Health Professionals Serving in Underserved Communities – Grants to improve health care, increase retention, increase representation of minority faculty members, enhance the practice environment, and provide information dissemination and educational support to reduce professional isolation. There are appropriations of \$5,000,000 per year for 2010</p>

through 2014 and sums as may be necessary for each subsequent year.
Sec. 5304 – Sec. 340G-1 Alternative Dental Health Care Providers Demonstration Project – Grants to 15 eligible entities to establish a demonstration program to establish training programs to train, or to employ, alternative dental health care providers in order increase access to dental health care services in rural and other underserved communities. There are appropriations for sums as may be necessary to carry out this section.

Sec. 5305 – Geriatric Education and Training; Career Awards; Comprehensive Geriatric Education – Grants to entities that operate geriatric education centers. Geriatric Career Incentive Awards – Grants to individuals who foster greater interest among a variety of health professionals in entering the field of geriatrics, long-term care, and chronic care management. There are appropriations of \$10,800,000 for 2011 through 2014 for education centers and \$10,000,000 for 2011 through 2013 for the career incentive grants.

Sec. 5306 Mental and Behavioral Health Education and Training Grants - Grants to eligible institutions of higher education for the development and implementation of interdisciplinary training of psychology graduate students for providing behavioral and mental health services, including substance abuse prevention and treatment services. There are appropriations for 2010 through 2013 - \$8,000,000 for training in social work; \$12,000,000 for training in graduate psychology, of which not less than \$10,000,000 shall be allocated for doctoral, postdoctoral, and internship level training; \$10,000,000 for training in professional child and adolescent mental health; and \$5,000,000 for training in paraprofessional child and adolescent work.

Sec. 5307 Cultural Competency, Prevention, and Public Health and Individuals with Disabilities Grants – Grants for the development, evaluation, and dissemination of research, demonstration projects, and model curricula for cultural competency, prevention, public health proficiency, reducing health disparities, and aptitude for working with individuals with disability training for use in health professions schools and continuing education programs. There are appropriations of sums as may be necessary for 2010 through 2015.

Sec. 5308 Advanced Nursing Education Grants – Grants for authorized nurse-midwifery programs that have as their objective the education of midwives; and are accredited by the American College of Nurse-Midwives Accreditation Commission for Midwifery education. No specific appropriation amount.

Sec. 5309 Nurse Education, Practice, and Retention Grants – Grants to enhance the nursing workforce by initiating and maintaining nurse retention programs. There are appropriations of sums as may be necessary for 2010 through 2012.

Sec. 5313 – Sec. 399V Grants to Promote Positive Health Behaviors and Outcomes –Grants to eligible entities to promote positive health behaviors and outcomes for populations in medically underserved communities through the use of community health workers. There are appropriations of sums as may be necessary for

2010 through 2014.

Sec. 5315 - Sec. 271 United States Public Health Sciences Track – Grants to any nonprofit entity for the purpose of carrying out cooperative enterprises in medical, dental, physician assistant, pharmacy, behavioral and mental health, public health, and nursing research, consultation, and education. There are appropriations beginning in 2010 of sums as may be necessary.

Sec. 5316 Demonstration Grants for Family Nurse Practitioner Training Programs – 3 year grants to eligible entities for the purpose of operating the nurse practitioner primary care programs. Grants for technical assistance to 1 or more FQHCs or NMHCs that have demonstrated expertise in establishing a nurse practitioner residency training program. Each grant will not exceed \$600,000 per year, and there are appropriations for sums as may be necessary for 2011 through 2014.

Sec. 5403 Interdisciplinary, Community-based Linkages. Area Health Education Centers - Awards to initiate health care workforce educational programs or to continue to carry out comparable programs that are operating an area health education center program. There are appropriations of \$125,000,000 for 2010 through 2014.

Sec. 5404 Workforce Diversity Grants – Stipends for diploma or associate degree nurses to enter a bridge or degree completion program, student scholarships or stipends for accelerated nursing degree programs, pre-entry preparation, advanced education preparation, and retention activities. No authorization for appropriation listed.

Sec. 5507 – Sec. 2008 Demonstration Projects to Address Health Professions Workforce Needs – Grants to conduct demonstration projects that are designed to provide the opportunity to obtain education and training for occupations in the health care field that pay well and are expected to either experience labor shortages or be in high demand. Assurance of Opportunities for Indian Populations – At least 3 grants will be reserved for an entity that is an Indian tribe, tribal organization, or Tribal College or University. There are appropriations of \$85,000,000 per year for 2010 through 2014.

Sec. 5507- Sec. 2009 Program for Early Detection of Certain Medical Conditions Related to Environmental Health Hazards – Grants for screening at-risk individuals for environmental health conditions and developing and disseminating public information and education. There are appropriations of \$23,000,000 2010 through 2014; and \$20,000,000 for each 5-fiscal year period thereafter.

Sec. 5508 – Sec. 749A Increasing Teaching Capacity – Teaching Health Center Development Grants – Grants to teaching health centers for the purpose of establishing new accredited or expanded primary care residency programs. There are appropriations of \$25,000,000 for 2010, \$50,000,000 for 2011, \$50,000,000 for 2012, and sums as may be necessary for each year thereafter. Not to exceed \$5,000,000 annually may be used for technical assistance program grants.

Sec. 5507 – Sec. 5601 Spending for Federally Qualified Health Centers – Grants for FQHCs. There are appropriations as follows: 2010, \$2,988,821,592; 2011, \$3,862,107,440; 2012, \$4,990,553,440; 2013, \$6,448,713,307; 2014, \$7,332,924,155; 2015, \$8,332,924,155; 2016, and each subsequent fiscal year, the amount appropriated for the preceding fiscal year adjusted by the product of—(i) one plus the average percentage increase in costs incurred per patient served; and (ii) one plus the average percentage increase in the total number of patients served.

Sec. 5604 –Sec. 520K Co-Locating Primary and Specialty Care in Community-Based mental Health Settings – Grants to establish demonstration projects for the provision of coordinated and integrated services to special populations in community-based mental and behavioral health settings. There are appropriations of \$50,000,000 for 2010 and sums as may be necessary for years 2011 through 2014

Sec. 5606 State Grants to Health Care Providers Who Provide Services to a High Percentage of Medically Underserved Populations or other Special Populations – Grants to health care providers who treat a high percentage of medically underserved populations or other special populations. There are appropriations of \$4,000,000 per year for 2010 through 2013.

Sec. 749B Rural Physician Training Grants – Grant program for assisting eligible entities in recruiting students most likely to practice medicine in underserved rural communities, providing rural-focused training and experience, and increasing the number of recent allopathic and osteopathic medical school graduates who practice in underserved rural communities. There are appropriations of \$4,000,000 per year for 2010 through 2013.

Sec. 768 Preventive Medicine and Public Health Training Program Grant – Grants to provide training to graduate medical residents in preventive medicine specialties. There are appropriations of \$43,000,000 for 2010, and sums as may be necessary for 2011 through 2015.
